### **Biographical Sketch**

Known as Dallas's first capitalist, Sarah Horton Cockrell was born in Virginia on January 13, 1819, to Enoch and Martha Horton. In 1844, Sarah moved to Texas, and after her marriage to Alexander Cockrell in 1847, became a resident of Dallas County. Alexander's business endeavors included a construction business, sawmill, gristmill, and rental space for business firms – all of which Sarah contributed to by maintaining the records, managing the finances, and handling correspondence.

After her husband's death in 1858, Sarah took over his many businesses, and in 1859 she opened the St. Nicholas Hotel, which later became the St. Charles. Sarah's most significant contribution to the city of Dallas was arguably the construction of an iron suspension bridge across the Trinity River in 1872. At the time, the bridge connected Dallas with all major roads south and west.

Throughout the rest of her life, Sarah's various entrepreneurial ventures would include buying and selling real estate to railroads, businesses, churches, and individuals residing in Dallas. By 1892, Sarah owned approximately one-fourth of downtown Dallas, as well as several thousand acres in Dallas County and smaller properties outside the county. In 1868, Sarah became a member of the Dallas County Agricultural Mechanical Association, one of only four women among its 100 or so male members.

Sarah Horton Cockrell died on April 26, 1892. Today, she is remembered not just as a leader in business, but also as a mother known for her generous and charitable

contributions to many charitable causes including the building of the First Methodist Church at Ross Avenue and Harwood Street in Dallas.
